College Essay Writing Program leaders David Henry Sterry and Arielle Eckstut reveal student successes this year which led to the Pathways Forward initiative. Students attending the breakout session at the launch on June 30, 2021.

Pathways Forward Launch

Succeed2gether launched its new **Pathways Forward** program on June 30, drawing more than 40 people out on a sweltering evening, excited to hear about academic and family mentoring for students starting in 8th grade and continuing for the first year after high school graduation. Others attended via a Zoom session – recorded, so it can be shared.

S2G founder Marcia Marley calls Pathways Forward "S2G's most important new initiative in my memory." S2G has provided free and low-cost tutoring to Essex County students in need for a dozen years.

"We have been very successful in bringing kids up to grade level and beyond," Marley said – but she added a recent discovery: Some S2G students still reach the brink of graduation without a plan for what comes next. Some even get accepted to college, but their families realize too late what financial aid is available.

David Sterry and Arielle Eckstut who started S2G's College Essay Writing program in 2019 explained that program's striking success: The first two graduates got into every college to which they applied. "Along the way, we found out how much more there is to it, though," Sterry said. "The incredible amount of paperwork, the super-complicated financial aid applications, even just figuring out how to register for the SAT."

Eckstut said her first essay-writing student had no career dreams, and no confidence he could go to college. With S2G's tutoring, her mentoring, and a committed family member's help, the student found his way to NJIT as an engineering student – on a full scholarship – next year.

S2G education director Toni Martin and Marley outlined the role individual mentors will have in helping students envision their future, identify resources and learn how to advocate for themselves. Mentors will receive training from professional educators and life coaches, Martin said. However, "the most important quality for a mentor is caring, and the ability to bond."

Pathways Forward will schedule frequent group seminars and workshops, beginning late summer. Some sessions will be specifically for parents, 8th and 9th graders, and 10th-12th graders. Student sessions will focus on potential career and vocational paths, study skills, and building of an academic résumé, among other topics.

At college application time, Pathways Forward will assist families with SAT prep, college applications, vocational training opportunities and internships. In addition, Pathways Forward will assist families with FAFSA applications and financial aid counseling.

At the launch event, 10 students joined a session led by mentor Laurie Lico Albanese. The kids produced sixword "essays" about their hopes and plans for the future: "I want to own multiple companies," said one. Another penned this little gem, apropos to all: "Keep going – so close to success."

Partnership with MontclairState

University

Dr. Sylvan's contributions to our programs were invaluable last year.

During the 2020/21 academic year, Dr. Sylvan provided S2G with 40 brilliant graduate students over two semesters from her class on Language Disorders in School Aged Children.

During the fall semester, her students not only provided additional tutoring sessions for math and ELA skils, significantly improving our students' academic foundation, they also strengthened their confidence and broadened their horizons with virtual trips around the world.

In addition to continued tutoring support in the spring semester, with Dr. Sylvan's assistance, her graduate students added a series of professional development workshops for our tutors on early literacy development. These workshops provided tips for supporting English language learners, and engaging and motivating students on Zoom, an essential skill for our tutors last year.

In addition to Dr. Sylvan's students, Krystal Woolston, Assistant Director of Center for Community Engagement, provided us with four Bonner students (Valerie Chica, Mikaela Guzman, Chris Giacomini, and Jayde Worthen) from MSU's Bonner Leader Program.

Each academic year, Bonner Leaders commit an average of 10 hours weekly to the community. These Bonner Leaders were an important additional resource that helped sustain and improve S2G's programs during a difficult year. They expanded our staff capacity and outreach through research, video production of our programs, and social media posts. They also were directly engaged in tutoring, monitoring sessions, and one even taught a voice workshop.

These MSU students provided new insights, energy, and expertise to our programs. We could not have provided the amount and quality of support for our students last year without them. We look forward to continuing and deepening this partnership going forward.



Tutoring offered at Y After-Care

This Fall, Succeed2gether will start a pilot program in which students who are in aftercare in Montclair schools will also be able to receive free one-on-one tutoring.

In partnership with the Montclair YMCA, S2G tutors will travel to the sites where aftercare is offered, and provide in-person tutoring once a week. The program will start at Nishuane Elementary School which caters to grades K through 2, and then expand to the other schools in the district.

Students need to be registered for and attend the after-care program run by the Montclair YMCA to participate in this program.

Our Year from Tutors, Students & Families

SESSIONS

This was a difficult year for every student, even more so for those heading into the pandemic already struggling or a step behind. But our students racked up successes notwithstanding.


Some students made the honor roll for the first time, others turned around a failing grade, improved language skills, mastered geometry, and learned to enjoy online learning in a one-on-one setting.

Many of the families S2G worked with this past year had few resources to sustain them during the switch to online instruction. Students struggled to keep up in "virtual" classrooms. Overburdened parents, and non-English-speaking families, were hard-put to assist them with their academics.

In S2G's personal "Zoom rooms," however, many students who felt lost in class were able to find their academic footing with the help of a volunteer tutor. Many even soared.

A high school senior raised his grade average in English from 10% to 98% in the second semester. A 5th grader improved from a C average to become April's Student of the Month.

Two graduating seniors at Montclair High School who participated in S2G's College Essay Writing program were accepted into five colleges each, and one garnered enough financial aid to make his "dream college" possible.

Enrichment Classes

This year 183 students attended our 34 enrichment classes, ranging from art, dance, and acting, to STEM, Mandarin, and violin.

Despite being virtual, the drumming and violin classes were extremely well attended. We even extended the original number of sessions to accommodate the enthusiasm!

Two volunteer violin assistants Eddie Liu and Anthony Zhai provided support for our violin classes which were at capacity. They helped in break-out rooms, with on screen visual support, and created and provided the students with material for practice.

The Rutgers 4-H Youth Development Program ran two STEM projects for us. The first was family-based, with five different science experiments completed at home. Then in the winter, students engaged with marine biologists as part of the Polar Scientists class, which included hands-on activities and creative projects.

In the spring, we partnered with the Montclair Art Museum and artist Raul Barcelona for an eight-week art program. Each week, he introduced an artist along with their style of art, and the students recreated their own work in that specific artist's style.

This year we also worked with Konnekt Global, a new C3 organization, created and operated by high school students. The students ran a series of weekly classes in five different areas: dance (hip-hop and Bollywood), art, theatre, science, and yoga. These classes were full!

Lovlee Tang of Lovlee Art Studios ran a one-night family session, an inspirational vision-board art project. It gave the families a way to plan ahead and look to the future.

We are extremely grateful to our class teachers and all the amazing community groups who made our classes such a success this year. See you in October!!


